AN EIGHTY YEAR OLD REMEMBERED BACK TO THE 1911 CELEBRATIONS

Looking forward with pleasure to the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana, and approaching 81 years, my wife and I like to talk of times remembered, sometimes grave, sometimes amusing. Our earliest Royal remembrance I think is the death of Edward VII and Coronation of George V. I well remember the gloom cast over the village and I wonder how the news reached county villages, with no phones and no radio, etc. Some shops nailed a piece of 6" black painted board down the front windows for mourning. The Village Band played suitable music on the evening of the funeral.

The Coronation of George V was celebrated in the village and I remember a tea was provided for the children and we were presented with a mug and medal, which we still have.

There were then one or two quiet years until war was declared in August, 1914. I had started as an apprentice at the Saddler's shop on the hill where my boss, a very patriotic old gentleman, was appointed recruiting officer. I have, somewhere, a photograph of the shop plastered up with recruiting posters and the well-known Lord Kitchener "Your Country Needs You!"

Although we had four terrible years of war, there were some amusing interludes, one I shall always remember; we had not enough musicians to form a full band, so we made up a Bugle Band, to head the LDV or "Dad's Army" parades, proceeding up Grace Church Street led by a very excited cyclist coming down the street (W. Chas. Fairweather). When we had sorted ourselves out, Sgt. Last took Charles to task and very severely told him: "Do you know you were on the wrong side of the road?" Charles replied, "Well, tha's the side I allus dew come."

The end of the 1914-18 war brought great celebration and times changed in the village, with the return of the men who had moved abroad and seen life and were not content to settle down to the old way of life.

We look back on the days of 1d. postage, the horse mail cart leaving at 8.00 p.m. and returning from Stowmarket at 6.00 a.m., farm wages 12/- per week, losing all wet weather, old people 70 and over 5/- weekly pension, we still grumble at some things, but what a lot we still have to be thankful for in our old age.

Children at Sir Robert Hitcham School send greetings for today and tomorrow.

How nice it will be when it is wedding time.
